Montane Planting

The Spey Catchment Initiative, a "partnership" charity set up alongside the Cairngorms National Park Authority, local councils and international businesses, is to plant about 30,000 native trees, including dwarf birch and montane willow, in Coire na Ciste on Cairn Gorm, at around 600m. The proposal has been heavily criticised by Nick Kempe in an article in his ParksWatchScotland website. Skiing infrastructure was closed down or removed from the Coire a number of years ago, although some viewed it as Cairngorm's best area for skiing since it holds snow longer.

The Cairngorm Club is affiliated to Mountaineering Scotland (MS). Your Club subscription includes their membership fee but members may not be aware of some of the benefits this brings. As well as representation, information and advice, you have access to BMC travel insurance and a range of subsidised training courses. They also distribute a monthly members news (sent 19 May) and ClimbScotland News, by email. DAY MEETS

We have had some fine day trips since the last newsletter went out. In February the Glenshee Ski Centre was our destination. A majority climbed several Munros in the area, e.g. Glas Maol, Cairn of Claise and Carn an Tuirc. At the same time several members spent the day doing winter skills training with instruction from Guy Bromby.

We headed to Glen Feshie in March and most of the party climbed Sgor Gaoith. This was our second attempt after last year's visit proved too stormy to reach high ground.

April's meet was a traverse through the mist from Glen Esk to Glen Clova, taking in the summit of Ben Tirran, and a visit to what remains of the RAF Wellington bomber that crashed there in 1942.

The May trip to Beinn a' Bhuird went well; more details can be found on page 15.

There's been good attendance on these day meets and it's great to see a mix of new faces and seasoned club members coming along.

A small increase in the cost of our minibus meets will be introduced in June. From then, a charge of £18 (up from £15) will be asked for all our meets where we travel by minibus. This still represents very good value for money to members and I'm sure you'll understand that increased costs make this charge necessary.

There are some great trips planned for the coming months. On Sunday 22nd June we'll be travelling to Blair Atholl for a visit to Ben a'Ghlo, where its 3 Munros will be the target of the President's party.

Our July meet is an overnighter at the remote Tarf Hotel bothy on Sat/Sun, 19th and 20th. A great chance for an adventure to this great location and accommodation.

A special coach trip to commemorate the Ben Macdui indicator centenary is planned for Saturday 9th August, when we will climb Scotland's 2nd highest from the Cairngorm Ski Centre.

For our annual September traverse this year, the President's party will be walking the Lairig Ghru from south to north, lunching at the Pools of Dee then exiting via the Chalamain Gap on the Rothiemurchus side.

A return to Perthshire on Sunday 18th October will have us heading to Ben Chonzie from Glen Lednock.

Details of all upcoming meets will be sent out by email closer to the dates, and can be seen on the website calendar.

Again, I'd like to thank the day meet organisers and minibus driving volunteers, whose efforts make these hill days happen.

Stravaigs have proved to be very popular amongst members for a variety of reasons. Some of us are just slowing down a bit, but want to maintain our walking and our contact with members. Some have had health issues, with these walks enabling them to build up their walking fitness.

Walks tend to be approximately 6 miles, though we do try to build in a shorter route if it is needed.

This year, so far we have had an excellent mix of walks taking us on tracks and to areas which have been new to many of us.

Day Meets take place once a month and can be by coach, mini-bus, car, or service bus. Meets are generally on Sundays but occasionally on Saturdays. Members should contact the Meet Organiser to book a place. The organiser or Day Meets Secretary can be contacted if any additional information is sought.

Meets generally leave Aberdeen at St. Margaret's School, Albyn Place, at 7am, with pick-ups possible on the route out (which may vary with meet location). Departure times and cost are listed on pages 8 and 9 of this Newsletter. On all Meets, an organised "President's Party" walk will be available for those new to the Club or for members who simply want a day out without the challenge of route-finding or navigation. The following Day meets are offered for Summer 2025.

Muir Cottage

At the time of writing our Muir work weekend is planned and we are grateful to Eilidh Scobbie, our new hut custodian for organising the work and the 21 volunteers and who have offered to help over the weekend to keep Muir properly maintained.

We have recently organised an electrician to provide a check on Muir electrics (EICR - electrical installation condition report), and are in the process of instructing an electrician to rectify any shortcomings.

We are also investigating an improvement on the heating system and controls and will shortly be testing a remote monitoring system which is aimed at being simple and more user friendly. Many thanks to Kevin Adam for his input and making this happen.

We are looking to refurbish the Muir bathrooms and it is hoped that this may be implemented in August. We are currently waiting on quotes for this work and will make a decision on the timing of the refurbishment in June.

Incorporation

The committee has been advised to consider converting the club to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation('SCIO') to make us a legal entity (ie able to enter into contracts and to own property) and to reduce the liability of office bearers who currently have to act in personal capacities on behalf of the club. We continue to investigate the implications of and steps required to follow this advice and will provide a report in due course and a full update at the AGM on 19 November.

Heavy Whalley

David "Heavy" Whalley, a renowned figure in British mountain rescue, passed away on Saturday, March 23, 2025, at the age of 72. He was a leader, mentor, and a true legend of the Mountain Rescue community, dedicating his life to helping others in the mountains. Club Weekend in Galloway, South West Scotland 12th September 2025

This is a relatively infrequently visited and unexplored area of Scotland - and the Club weekend on 12th September offers the opportunity to remedy this, with great locations for walks, hikes, rock climbing and other outdoor activities.

Did you know that in John Buchan's famous book, "The Thirty Nine Steps (John Buchan, 1915) Richard Hannay chose to go to the wild places of Galloway to escape his pursuers? "Over a long ridge of moorland I took my road, skirting the side of a high hill which the herd had called Cairnsmore of Fleet".

Did you also know that Gaelic was spoken here until the late 1700's? The name itself means 'land of the foreign Gaels' (see the book - Galloway: The Lost Province of Gaelic Scotland). Many secrets of the area's past lie in the Gaelic/Scots names of its hills.

It's a fair journey down south from Aberdeenshire (about the same time to get to Skye or Glencoe - i.e. 4 ½ hrs) but worth it - I recommend going via the Dalveen Pass or the Mennock Pass through the Lowther Hills. We are staying in the Galloway Activity Centre bunkhouse on Loch Ken, north of Castle Douglas (see https://lochken.co.uk).
